# NEWS FROM HEADQUARTERS

The SCV National Convention voted to increase the recording fee for *new* members from \$2 to \$5 effective immediately. The increase will help offset the cost of the free membership certificate sent to all new members.

The delegates also approved a \$2 dues increase for all members. National SCV dues are now \$20. The new rate is in effect now.

The Constitution was amended to require all camps to remit dues to International Headquarters by February 1st, each year. Under the newly adopted language, members whose dues have not been paid by this date will be suspended. In order to become current, the member will have to pay his annual dues plus a \$5 reinstatement fee.

This will mean that all membership dues in our camp will have to be paid to our camp by January 15th in order that they can be processed and remitted to Headquarters by the required date.

# **DEDICATION CEREMONY**

Old City Cemetery Magnolia, Ark. August 24, 1997 By: Earl Mc Cown Jr.

It is a beautiful Southern Sunday afternoon in Magnolia, Arkansas. Some one hundred and fifty or more people are gathered together to Dedicate a Monument to the Unknown Confederate Soldiers interred there, to honor Major General John Porter Mc Cown on the anniversary of his birthday and to remember Colonel George Washington Mc Cown who are also interred there.

This Monument was made possible by the Sons of Confederate Veterans and the United Daughters of the Confederacy from Columbia County.

In the crowd can be seen many of the ladies in their ante-bellum dresses and many reinactors (from Louisiana, Magnolia and other cities in Arkansas), in their Confederate Uniforms. From the north end of the cemetery can be heard military orders and commands being given, the Color/Honor Guard is being formed. Listen closely, yes there it is, the sound of a field drummer, beating out the cadence for the troops. Now appears the Color/Honor Guard marching forward with the Confederate Flags, in all their splendor led by the Stars and Stripes.

The Colors are posted in a semi-circle near the new monument that is just to the west of the Graves of the Unknowns Soldiers and just to the south of General Mc Cown's grave. The monument is draped with a large Confederate Flag.

After brief introductions, Captain Williams led a prayer and there were brief remarks by Compatriot Everett Burr(State Commander of SCV) and Ms. Betty Lewis, (President of the UDC).

Now, I hear the unmistakable mournful sound of a lone Highland Piper (Sgt Pat Mc Reynolds) as he begins to play "Dixie". When the piper was finished, there was a resounding "Rebel Yell" from the crowd.

This writer had the distinct honor and privilege of speaking to this large and loyal group of

Southerners. My topic was the "Life and Times of General Mc Cown and Colonel Mc Cown". The speech, though brief, seemed to be well accepted by the group. Afterward the Color/Honor Guard was positioned near the new monument, as the Piper began to play "Amazing Grace", the Confederate Flag was removed and the Monument unveiled. A large wreath was then placed nearby.

Then the Salute began with the firing of two pieces of artillery and a squad of muskets. As the drummer beats cadence, ceases and No. 1 gun fires, the drummer beats again, ceases and No. 2 gun fires, the drummer beats again, ceases and the squad of muskets fires. This continues until both guns have fired four shots each and the muskets have fired three volleys.

After the salute, this writer was marched 'front and center', where the Colors (Stars and Bars) was retrieved from the flag pole, folded and presented to me, by Commander Maurice Amason. I was truly surprised, and will cherish this Flag and the moment, forever.

Then came the closing prayer by Captain Williams, the Color Guard forms, retrieves all Colors, marches off the field as the mournful sound of a lone bugler plays "Taps". Following this came a thunderous Cheer (Rebel Yell) from just about everyone present.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to Commander Maurice Amason, (General Thomas P. Dockery Camp 1577); The members of Johnson's 15th Arkansas Memorial Color Guard of the Sons of Confederate Veterans and to Ms. Betty Faye Lewis, President, Columbia Memorial Chapter No. 1374, United Daughters of the Confederacy for inviting me to speak and for allowing me to participate in this momentous occasion and I congratulate them all for a 'Job Well Done'.

I would also like to commend Compatriot Charles Walthall for his devotion and efforts in maintaining the Confederate Graves at the Magnolia Cemetery. .
